



### MACQUARIE AGRICULTURAL PATHWAYS PROGRAM

Macquarie's Agricultural Pathways Program (MAPP) assists students in transitioning what they learn in the classroom into their real world, and develops the skills necessary to be employable in the Agriculture sector or to prepare them for entry into Tertiary-based programs. Our first five students write ...

We began the Macquarie Agricultural Pathways Program in early Term 3. We were all very excited to have been chosen for the program, but also guite nervous about what it would involve and what we would have to do. As the weeks went on we got to know each other and learned to work as a team to achieve a number of different jobs.

A typical Toongi day would involve meeting Mrs Taylor at school in the morning, loading the Everest and heading out to either Grandale or the Site Office where we would meet Mr Job and make a plan for the day. We would always have a Tool Box Talk during which we would discuss the safety requirements and make a list of the equipment we would need. Once we were organised, we would get to work.

Some of the jobs we did included fencing, drafting sheep and cattle, marking calves, drenching and checking crops. In doing this work, we came to realise and value the importance of Mathematics, Science and English in the Agricultural world. For example, we




would not have been able to do any fencing without first calculating the amount of wire and posts we would need.

We loved seeing our parents and teachers get involved - braving the chalk, taking photos and jumping in and helping out wherever they could.



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# Teaching and Learning at Macquarie

2022 saw the role out of our Macquarie Teaching and Learning Framework. This was launched in our school community early in Term 2 and we were excited to share our hard work with the broader school community.

hroughout the remainder of the year we spent time familiarising both staff, students and parents with the language of our framework. The framework, based on Guy Claxton's Learning Power, aims to engage our students even further in their learning and help them to understand that learning is learnable.

Each term in 2022 saw our community focus on one of the 4Rs (Resilient, Relational, Resourceful and Reflective) of our framework.



Resourceful

Term 1 saw our community focus on being Resourceful. This included supporting our students with questioning, planning and making connections. Of particular note was the curiosity and questioning of our Pre-Kindergarten to Year 2 students with phrases such as 'What if?' 'How come?'



Relational

to being Relational. For many of us collaborating, modelling, empathising and listening comes easily. However, for others it is a challenge. Our teachers were deliberate in Term 2 in ensuring they incorporated being relational in their learning. It was amazing to see **sharing circles in classrooms** and **mind maps on our whiteboard desks** as students

collaborated and shared their ideas

In **Term 2** our school focus moved



Resilient

Being Resilient was the focus of our **Term 3** Learning Power. This was particularly relevant as we embarked on the Years 7 to 9 Camps. As a school we shared the story of Genevieve Gregson, **who conveyed persistence**, **one of the key attributes of resilience**, to overcome injury at an elite sport level.

Persistence is about recognising and understanding the feelings you have when learning hasn't gone according to plan or you are tackling something outside your comfort zone. Our students, after discussing persistence at school, transferred this during camp week. The base level of persistence for many of our students in the outside world was there. The challenge was to transfer this to our schoolbased learning.



Reflection


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Kindergarten Orientation

### Book Week

### Reading can transport us from our own world to another.

etween the pages of a book, we can learn about cultures that are different to our own, or become immersed in the lives of fictional characters. We can also acquire knowledge and skills, learn new words and phrases, and experience a range of emotions.

Each year since 1945 the Children's Book Council of Australia (CBCA) has brought children and books together across Australia through Book Week. During this time public libraries and schools spend one glorious week celebrating books and Australian children's authors and illustrators. Each year a new theme is chosen with the 2022 theme being 'Dreaming With Eyes Open'. Book Week reminds us of the importance of reading and the joy that we can all find in reading a good story.

To celebrate Book Week, Macquarie Junior School students (and staff) dressed up as their favourite book characters. The children went to great lengths with their costumes, as did the staff. Mrs Job was spectacular as Professor Minerva McGonagall from the Harry Potter books, and Mr Rufus was very convincing as Goldilocks!

At the assembly, students paraded across the stage in their costumes and participated in quizzes to guess the book, or to name the characters from a particular book. Mrs Mitchell took the opportunity to read Jackie French's Diary of a Wombat, an old family favourite, complete with fabulous illustrations by Bruce Whatley.

Our Senior School students joined in the fun by reading in tutor time and reading with buddy classes in the Junior School

### MATHEMATICS MASTERY

PRIME Maths is a program that we have established in our Junior School classrooms. PRIME is based on the Concrete Pictorial Abstract (CPA) educational approach, and allows our students to work through mathematical concepts and problems to build their confidence and mastery.

The CPA approach uses physical and visual aids to build a student's understanding of abstract topics. Students are introduced to new mathematical concepts through the use of hands-on, concrete resources such as counters, place value blocks and fraction discs. When they are comfortable solving problems with physical aids, they move to using pictures and pictorial representations of the objects they were using. This progression then evolves to students using the abstract (numbers and symbols) to solve problems.

There is a common misconception amongst us that the use of maths manipulatives is only for learners who find mathematics concepts difficult. A perfect example of this is the student hiding their hands under the desk worrying about being 'seen' by others as they count on their fingers. Concrete resources can be used in a great variety of ways at every level of learning. All students, regardless of their ability, can benefit from their use. Maths manipulatives promote reasoning and discussion, enabling students to explain and justify their answers to a problem, further deepening their understanding and contributing to mastery of a topic. It is absolutely okay to use your fingers to count! We should continue to encourage this process with our children if needed.

Pictorial recording is key to ensuring that students can make the link between a concrete resource and the abstract. Without it, children can find actually visualising a problem difficult, which is why drawing a pictorial representation of the problem is encouraged students are not physically handling the objects, but benefiting from the visual support they provide. One of the ways we teach pictorial representation through PRIME is through the use of the bar model. This is also a common strategy used in the Mathletics program.

Finally, students learn to use abstract symbols to solve problems. Our daily Mathematics lessons each build on the CPA steps and help our students better understand the relationship between numbers and symbols and the real world. This, in turn, helps deepen their understanding of the concept they are learning. The abstract nature

of mathematics can be confusing for children, but through the use of concrete materials and pictorial representations they are able to 'see' and make sense of what is actually happening.

For the most effective learning to take place, our students need to go back and forth between each of the stages. This ensures concepts are reinforced, understood and mastered!

Camps provide a wonderful opportunity to build confidence and resilience, improve independence and problem-solving skills, make new connections and deepen existing friendships.

ur Macquarie Outdoor Education program begins in Stage 1, with our Year 2 students having their first overnight camp experience, with a sleepover at school! The Stage 1 sleepover is a fantastic first step to a school camp – all the benefits of an overnight excursion, with the familiarity of being at school.

Students in Year 3 visited Taronga Western Plains Zoo for their overnight Zoo Snooze, and Year 4 headed to the Burrendong Sport and Recreation facility for two nights. Students participated in kayaking and peddle car activities, made damper and worked together to build shelters and learn camp survival skills.

Year 5 travelled to Broken Bay during Term 3, after several attempts during the year in which rain and flood waters put a dampener on things! Broken Bay Sport and Recreation Camp is situated an hour north of Sydney on the Hawkesbury River. Within groups, our students were challenged to work together in canoeing, archery, raft-building and beach games.

### Year 12 Retreat


