Ochre-Up

In Week 9 Term 1, selected Indigenous students participated in the Ochre-Up Culture Through the Lens project. The Ochre-Up project is a one-day workshop for First Nations students to explore identity, belonging and ownership in a culturally safe setting whilst completing a photography workshop on Country. Students engaged in deep conversations about family connections and who they are and where they are from. They engaged in craft activities such as making their own headdress/belts and armbands from native plants, emu feathers and quandong seeds. Students experimented with painting techniques for designs on earrings and clapsticks for their shoot. They worked first-hand with ochre from Country, by grinding and texturising it before application for their photography portrait session. The students' work and photographs were showcased during our NAIDOC Week in Term 2.

Indigenous Families Gathering

In the past years, Macquarie has held parent lunches every term. This is a time for parents and carers of our Indigenous students to come together with members of our Executive team and our Aboriginal Education and Engagement Officer. It is a chance for families to meet one another and have conversations that they might not get the chance to have.

In Term 1 2024, we hosted our first Indigenous Families Gathering for our parents and/or carers and students of Macquarie. This year we held a twilight event with a barbecue dinner.

NAIDOC Day 2024 was a vibrant display of cultural immersion, with activities ranging from traditional face painting and ochre exhibitions to food sampling, Indigenous games and captivating Indigenous art.

Guiding our students

The Teaching and Learning Framework at Macquarie is a shared set of concepts and practices that guide our work with students from Pre-Kindergarten to Year 12.

The 4Rs of our Teaching and Learning Framework and their 'buttons' (Resourceful, Relational, Resilient and Reflective) are learning dispositions (or behaviours and attitudes) that research has associated with powerful learning.

Our work with the Teaching and Learning Framework continues, this year additionally apparent in classroom magnet sets. Each magnet set 'teases out' the elements of each learning disposition. Teachers, through the magnets, explicitly link lesson activities to elements of learning dispositions.

This semester, staff members have been trialling the incorporation of the 4Rs explicitly in their unit programming. Additionally, they are working hard on the production of a 4Rs Manual of Teaching and Learning Strategies. The variety and depth of these approaches are testament to the learning energy in our Macquarie classrooms.

Year 6 Travel to Canberra

Heading to Canberra in Year 6 is practically a rite of passage for many Year 6 students and our Macquarie students are no different. In Term 1, our Year 6 students travelled to Canberra for their four-day camp.

Over the course of the week, students visited many educational and recreational attractions within Canberra. Our trip started with a visit to the National Capital Authority where students learned about the history of Canberra. It also happened to be Canberra's birthday on our first day there. Following this we travelled to the National Gallery of Australia and finished the day with a tour of the Australian Institute of Sport and the Sportex facility.

Day 2 saw students visit Government House, the Australian War Memorial, the National Museum of Australia and the CSIRO. The Australian War Memorial was an incredible experience with many of our students able to find members of their family on the wall of remembrance and place a poppy to remember them. The CSIRO gave students the chance to be hands-on as they raced around the facility completing a scavenger hunt. No Canberra trip would be complete without a trip to Zone 3 for some Laser Tag. Students, and staff, had an incredible time ducking and weaving their way through the course.

Thursday consisted of a tour past the embassies, a trip to the National Electoral Centre and a walk-through of Parliament House. Our final night involved a visit to Questacon where our students had sole access to the facility. Questacon was an incredible chance for students to engage in STEM-based activities and even challenge their bravery on the freefall slide.

PR1ME TIME FOR MATHEMATICS!

We have been using PR1ME Mathematics in our Pre-Kindergarten and Junior School classrooms since 2021. PR1ME is based on the Concrete Pictorial Abstract (CPA) educational approach and allows our students to work through mathematical concepts and problems, building their confidence and mastery. Aligning to the new NSW Mathematics curriculum, this program and our students' engagement with it, is only becoming stronger.

PR1ME is a program designed to build a strong foundation in mathematics for young learners. It integrates best practices from leading international math curriculum, ensuring that our students are not only learning mathematical concepts but also applying them in meaningful ways. The program focuses on problem-solving, critical thinking, and real-world applications, which are essential skills for our students' future success.

One of the standout features of the PR1ME Mathematics program is its hands-on learning approach. Students are encouraged to explore mathematical concepts through various interactive activities and manipulatives. This method of learning helps students to better understand abstract ideas by visualising and physically manipulating objects.

There is a common misconception amongst us that the use of maths manipulatives are only for learners who find mathematics concepts difficult. A perfect example of this is the student hiding their hands under the desk, worrying about being 'seen' by others counting on their fingers. Concrete resources can be used in a great variety of ways, at every level of learning. All students, regardless of their ability, can benefit from their use. Maths manipulatives promote reasoning and discussion, enabling students to explain and justify their answers to a problem, further deepening their understanding and contributing to mastery of a topic. It is absolutely okay to use your fingers to count! We should continue to encourage this process with our children if needed.

PR1ME Mathematics also places a significant emphasis on solving word problems. Word problems require our students to read carefully, interpret the information, and apply their mathematical knowledge to find solutions. By regularly practising word problems, students learn to approach challenges logically and confidently, preparing them for more complex mathematical tasks in the future.

Inspirational Science

The start of 2024 came with much anticipation of new beginnings and great learning.

We have such a wonderful team of staff members who are determined to create innovative and inspirational learning activities that engage students in the pursuit of science. Whether it is modelling cells or radioactive decay, conducting engaging investigations or interactive learning activities, our staff work collaboratively to refine and improve student outcomes in them all.

Term 1 welcomed our next batch of Year 7 scientists who will become our HSC Science cohort of 2029! They commenced by learning about high school science and conducted a research assignment on a famous scientist who they represented at our annual Famous Scientist

Year 8 created models of cells from plasticine, Year 9 used M&M's to represent different isotopes of elements and Year 11 Biology replicated cell organelles.

Term 1 saw a selection of Year 9 and Year 10 students represent Macquarie at the annual Science and Engineering Challenge. Some of our teams won their groups at a variety of challenges, which resulted in Macquarie placing a close second out of the schools in the district.

However, the pinnacle of science for the year was the ecological fieldwork conducted on the Great Barrier Reef by our Year 11 students. It was an incredible opportunity to apply the skills learned in class (and on the school grounds) to a World Heritage Site.

For Macquarie students in Years 10, 11 and 12, those decisions and processes are supported by our Growth Mentoring program, with students working one-on-one with mentors Mr David Gates and Ms Penny Chilton as they take steps to understand the path and work through the decisions ahead of them.

These conversations start out very much led by the mentor, as students identify interests, articulate goals and seek input from their parents about choices for Year 11. As students progress in maturity and confidence, they take the reins of the conversation and bring their own questions and needs to ongoing consideration of postschool goals, managing workload, learning well and developing their leadership skills.

For Year 10 students just beginning on this process, having a systematic approach and mentor they know helps to navigate decisions about Year 11. For Year 12 students who have completed three years of Growth Mentoring, the increased confidence in articulating goals and communicating about themselves is profound. Mr Gates commented that "students get out what they put into this process, and it's exciting to see them pushing towards their own questions and needs."
