This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger."

Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests." "

2020 also saw the implementation of the Second Step Social and Emotional Learning program across the Junior School. Staff and students worked diligently to develop their skills for learning, empathy, emotional management and problem solving. Students across our Junior School now have a clear language for listening rules, focusing attention and following directions.

Presentation Day was a fitting way to end the year, with a number of students being recognised for their effort and achievement. Whilst we celebrated them on this day, it is important to note that every Macquarie student should be proud of their focus and achievements in 2020.

# This year, the Junior School Wellbeing Team was eager to implement the Second Step program across the Junior School.

Second Step is a research-based, teacher-informed, and classroom-tested program to promote the social-emotional development, safety and wellbeing of children. It gives the students the skills to excel in and out of the classroom. It incorporates practical lessons and strategies that were introduced each fortnight at the Junior School Assembly and then reinforced in the classroom.



Each term there was a focus to promote lifelong success and schoolwide improvement. Students during 2020 were introduced to the following themes:

- Setting the Stage Being Welcoming, Being Safe, Being Respectful, Being Responsible.
- Skills for Learning Listening, Focusing Attention, Using Self-talk, Being Assertive.
- Empathy Empathy, Identifying Feelings, Same and Different Feelings, Showing Compassion.
- Emotion Management Feelings in my Body, Stop and Name Feelings, Calming Down, Managing and Learning Challenges.
- Problem Solving Say the Problem, Think of Solutions, Explore Consequences, Pick the Best Solution.
- Friendship Skills Inviting to Play, Playing Fairly, Making Amends, Handling Name-Calling.

We want all of our children to feel safe and secure when they come to Macquarie and be able to concentrate on getting the best possible education. Second Step allowed our school to teach lifelong skills such as making friends, managing emotions, solving problems and dealing with peer pressure.

We look forward to continuing the Second Step program so that we can build on the student's social and emotional development at Macquarie in 2021.







# Skills and Services Program

# Advanced Learning Centre

Throughout 2020, despite COVID-19 restrictions, Macquarie's Advanced Learning Centre (ALC) has been active. ALC classes engaged with real world mentors and projects across the world from our doorstep all the way to Romania and back.

Stage 5 ALC HSIE applied their skills to a project that Orana Regional Development Australia (RDA) set for them in investigating population growth in Dubbo and analysing why people choose to come, why they leave and what they stay for. They were briefed by Director Megan Dixon in a workshop at school. This research will be used to inform RDA's future direction and projects.

In moving from a local lens to a global one, the ALC interviewed Razvan Gheorghita, a past Macquarie parent and COO of Bristol Logistics in Romania via Zoom. With this information they assessed the internal migration patterns of Romania, the influence of the European Union and drew connections between migration on a global scale.

Stage 4 ALC English studied the epic Anglo-Saxon poem, *Beowulf*, and in their investigation of narrative arcs they participated in a Zoom workshop with an Australian executive from Sony Playstation. They learned about characterisation and setting in video games. Digging into how new narrative forms such as video games are seeking to 'break' established narrative plot lines to engage players, as well as how cultural references such as famous literary works like *Beowulf* are capitalised upon in this modern medium.

Finally, 2020 saw Gifted and Talented expert Dr Ruth Phillips delivering bespoke training packages and coaching Macquarie staff in order to hone their skills with a leader in the field.

### Agriculture and Primary Industries


This year, Agriculture and Primary Industries students were busy clearing and replanting the greenhouse, small Ag plot and setting up other ag paddocks. We were so excited by the heavens opening as we finally had feed!

Stage 5 Agriculture focused on pasture production where we learned about different areas of pasture management in Australia. Students also grew barley, wheat, lupins, lucerne and clovers in the greenhouse.

We planted cotton in the revamped and cleared out small Ag plot. Students observed first-hand the gene technology this plant has to be able to control weeds and pest insects. They learned about beneficial insects and how they help in the management of crops and also how to use a count sheet and identify predators and prey in trap crops.

The 2021 HSC class studied many areas including the complexities of soils and how nutrients work from organic and non-organic sources, about land degradation, chemical reactions of various forms of salts with crop production, salinity and loss of yields. They also planted cotton plants in the greenhouse as part of their elective.

Primary Industries students worked hard through many units towards their Certification II in Agriculture operating machinery, weed control both physically and chemically, irrigation systems and planted sunflowers.





They integrated animal husbandry units together to complete before our show cattle left due to COVID-19 restrictions. Primary Industries said goodbye to Boudicea Blatch as she finished Year 12. They also had the opportunity to bond and work with our Pre-Kindergarten students to introduce our beloved silky chickens to them to help them learn about recycling food scraps.

# English


This year saw a range of topics, novels and themes studied in English. The English teachers did a wonderful job transitioning to the online module during Terms 1 and 2. The following are some highlights from the English classrooms:

Year 7 studied Australian Poetry, which was followed by a study of the novel, *Trash*. For their assessment task, students created a multimodal diorama or a multimodal photo essay on the novel. Both units worked together linking to the overarching theme of sustainability and empathy to contribute to the students' global understanding. During Term 3, all classes from Years 7 to 9 were able to complete an online incursion by the company Poetry in Action called 'Inter-National Anthem'.

Stage 4 ALC English studied the epic Anglo-Saxon poem, *Beowulf.* In their investigation of genre, they participated in a Zoom workshop with an Australian executive from Sony Playstation who provided industry knowledge on characterisation and setting in video games. They were looking to understand how new narrative forms such as video games are seeking to 'break' established narrative plot lines to engage players, as well as how cultural references such as famous literary works like *Beowulf* are capitalised upon in this modern medium. Year 8 enjoyed studying Poetry and Advertising. Year 9 students studied Journeys of the Displaced and looked at Ahn Doh's memoir, *The Happiest Refugee*. Another highlight was the interactive online tool Two Billion Miles where students were able to gain insight into real experiences of refugees and their plight for asylum. Year 10 completed a film study of *Cinderella Man* and a novel study, *The Outsiders* along with Shakespeare's *Macbeth*. The ALC Stage 5 class studied the novel, *To Kill a Mockingbird*. In Preliminary Standard English, students worked on the module, Reading to Write. They learned about a variety of text types and submitted three pieces of writing to peers and teachers for editing.

Year 12 Advanced English studied Shakespeare's *The Tempest* and Margaret Atwood's retelling of this play, *Hag-Seed*, during Term 1. Towards the end of the year they looked at the Critical Study of Literature with a focus on T.S. Eliot's poetry. Standard English completed Henry Lawson's short stories during Term 1. Students studied a Craft of Writing, in which they also looked at short texts on which to model their own writing.

# Mathematics

This year Macquarie welcomed Mrs Bailey and Mr Maloney to the Mathematics faculty, and also Mrs Garland and Mr McNee who taught some Maths classes. Some highlights of the year included:

### Year 7

Year 7 students used a computer program to design and construct artworks that demonstrated line and rotational symmetry. ALC students completed the Australian Maths Trust Maths Challenge, receiving six credits. Students also measured perimeters of objects in the playground using trundle wheels.

### Year 8


Year 8 students completed an equations scavenger hunt. ALC students had the chance to extend their logical thinking skills solving a range of lateral thinking and mathematical problems. It was also interesting to complete research about the famous mathematician Pythagoras.

### Year 9

5.3 designed and constructed a clinometer to measure angles of elevation around the school as part of their assessment task.
5.2 collected and analysed student height, arm spans and foot length.
5.1 investigated the relationship between surface area and volume.

### Year 10

5.3 completed a self-guided problem solving topic relating to surface area and volume. 5.2 carried out multi-step chance experiments to compare theoretical and practical outcomes. 5.1 researched credit cards and advantages/disadvantages.

### Year 11

The Standard class completed a statistical investigation comparing two variables to see if there was a correlation. Advanced students used an online graphing program to sketch trigonometric curves. The Extension I class simulated the Pigeonhole Principle using lollies and tape.

### Year 12

Year 12 students completed a Zoom study session with Stuart Palmer from PD4Maths in preparation for the HSC. Standard students weighed animals from the Ag plot to test if weights were normally distributed (the chickens' weights were normally distributed but sheep were not). Advanced students wrote statistical reports answering the question "Is normal distribution appropriate?"

### German

German took tentative steps in 2020 as it was the first year German was taught at Macquarie. The previous Stage 4 Japanese students took to German with vigour and enthusiasm as they navigated their way through the new content with their new teacher. 2020's Year 8 cohort embraced the new language with a different excitement which comes from a first exposure to a second language.

Many exciting events were planned, such as a film festival in Sydney; *Kino for Kids*, and dinner in a German restaurant, which were foiled by COVID-19 restrictions, but we made much fun of the lessons regardless.

All of our German students immersed themselves in German culture; playing games and having friendly little conversations, introducing themselves to one another and getting to know the people in their class. We experienced a virtual trip to Germany; flying over Berlin and experiencing Munich and the Oktoberfest Oompah Bands. Our classes also learned about German traditional dress and hobbies. We looked at the differences between schooling in Australia and schooling in German-speaking countries, which can be, at times, an eye-opening experience. Our discussions about the relevance of uniforms were often enlightening and empowering, as our students were given the opportunity to express their opinions.

We experienced the quirkiness that is *Bibi und Tina*; a teen-based movie series about a pair of happy German girls, one of whom has special powers. The students seemed to embrace the oddities of the movies and they proved to be great stress relief for everybody at busy times of the term.

All students had an opportunity to play Völkerball (dodgeball) and understand the value of good sportsmanship in the German culture.

We look forward to what 2021 will bring with hopes of more opportunities for excursions and cultural immersion.

### Human Society and Its Environment (HSIE)

2020 was an interesting year to study the humanities. We saw a range of topics studied through each course. The HSIE teachers did a great job at providing engaging content throughout the year. Here are some of the highlights:

**Stage 4 Geography** participated in an orienteering activity, navigating their way around the school using compasses and maps. The aim was to find a series of markers located on the map in the shortest time period. This friendly competition was a fun and engaging fieldwork activity where students could practise their geography skills.

**Stage 4 History** studied the topic 'Investigating the Past' during which they were able to use the school archaeological dig site. This dig site was created in the 2019 IBE program. Students worked in groups where they acted as archaeologists using tools such as spades, toothbrushes, paint brushes, etc. to search for items in the dig site. They discovered a variety of artefacts such as pottery, jewellery and bones.

In Term 3, **Stage 5 ALC** students were given the opportunity to learn and engage with real world mentors. The Director of Regional Development, Megan Dixon, visited our classroom and gave a presentation on her work with RDA Orana, discussing with the students the importance of developing and growing regional NSW centres for the sustainability and longevity of the country. Moving from a local lens to a global one, the ALC also engaged in a Zoom conference with Razvan Gheorghita, a past Macquarie parent and COO of Bristol Logistics in Romania, who discussed the reasons for, and effects of the mass emigration of Romanian citizens. Engaging with these mentors was a fantastic opportunity to link classroom work with the 'real' world, to not only deepen students' understanding of the class topic, but also the broader world around them.

It was a very interesting year to study **Business, Economics and Commerce**. Students researched the current environment throughout a number of lessons. # PDHPE

2020 brought a raft of new ways for students to manage the health, physical activity and wellbeing of themselves and others. With fitness and dance sessions conducted by Mrs Parkes and Miss Spencer via Zoom, students were able to maintain a positive connection with their peers while in isolation. Term 2 saw a return to school and Mr Crisante's Stage 5 students began engaging in project-based learning in Physical Activity and Sports Studies which enabled them to thoughtfully plan for a Recreational Facility that could be constructed in Dubbo, with the best applications being submitted to Mayor Ben Shields for feedback.

In Term 4, Years 7 and 8 students worked collaboratively to compose their own dance performances while Years 9 and 10 students used the knowledge they had gained to develop a movement sequence utilising Gymnastics skills. Stage 6 PDHPE students were able to more readily apply a number of practical applications thanks to our new school gym which is filled with a range of resistance training equipment. The gym also began being open for all Stage 6 students during one study period each week and for Year 10 students during lunchtimes to provide another avenue to improve their physical, social and mental wellbeing.

#### Year 7

## Science

This year, Macquarie students thrived in both the classroom and at home. From learning how to safely use a Bunsen burner in Year 7, through to understanding complex intermolecular bonding in Stage 6 Chemistry, our students worked hard to expand their scientific minds and find out more about why the world is the way it is. Each year group made some remarkable discoveries along the way:

**Year 7** discovered that mixing Bi-Carb soda and vinegar creates carbon dioxide. What else do you do with Bi-Carb soda and vinegar, you use it to shoot film canisters into the air! Year 7 enjoyed competing to see who could create the perfect ratio to shoot their rocket the highest.

Year 8 discovered that energy can be transferred and transformed. They were given the task of creating a wacky energy transfer machine. Each machine was very different, with some using dominos to push toy cars, others using oscillating fans to transfer objects and one using mentos in coke to see a chemical reaction.

**Year 9** discovered the periodic table of elements. They memorised the first 20 and researched how we use these elements in everyday life.

Year 10 discovered how fossils are made and took an in depth look at some real fossils. The students thought this meant studying some of their teachers, but they soon realised it meant looking at old rocks and bones. They took a trip back in time to see how evolution has shaped the world around us.

**Year 11** discovered how bacteria grows in organic products. They observed micro bacterial growth in different types of food and water and compared their growth rate and size. Pictures have not been included for obvious reasons.

**Year 12** discovered the difference between DC and AC motors. They constructed simple DC motors that utilised electromagnetic fields to create movement.

It was a big year for all of our scientists!

In Term 4 the boys took on a personal project each and began work on a TV cabinet and a dining room table.


#### Food Technology


