## HEADMASTER'S ADDRESS



(Presented at the 2022 Presentation Days.)

Good morning. May I pay my respects to Elders past and present and, in particular, those here with us today.

I would also like to welcome Mr Martyn Mitchell, Chair - Macquarie Anglican Grammar School Council, Mrs Clare Pendlebury, Member of School Council, Mrs Janet Jensen, Chief Financial and Operating Officer - The Sydney Anglican Schools Corporation, Mr Tony Tan, Business Partner - The Sydney Anglican Schools Corporation, staff, parents, friends and students of Macquarie Anglican Grammar School.

I want to begin by asking you to join me to thank each and every member of the Macquarie team for their incredible work this year.

2022 commenced with many unknowns and our staff members have worked together with the whole community to see many wonderful successes occur. From our camps, sporting successes, cultural expansion and significant academic growth, the Macquarie community has benefitted from the incredible work of our Team Macquarie, particularly our Senior Executive team: Mrs Mitchell, Mrs Simcox, Mrs Rankmore, Mrs Job, Mr Richardson, Mr Roe and Rev Owen.

2022 has seen the first year of our implementation of the Macquarie Teaching and Learning Framework with its four R's of Resilient, Resourceful, Relational and Reflective. Each of these R's is full of habits and dispositions that will empower our students to be learners for life.

Skills such as planning, focusing, modelling and refining join together with dispositions like refocusing, collaborating, persisting and making connections, work together to provide our students with the tools they need for the future.

When we first launched the Macquarie Teaching and Learning Framework, we were clear that we were commencing a five-year journey together to full implementation. We have been blessed in 2022 to see significant growth throughout the school in the implementation of the framework.

As we move into 2023 we will see the language of the framework become embedded throughout the school. We will see posters and signs throughout the school and fridge magnets and webinars for home as we work together as a whole community to implement the framework.

2023 will also see the commencement of the implementation of the Macquarie Wellbeing Framework.

*The Macquarie Wellbeing Framework has been developed by our Wellbeing staff in collaboration with experts from the Association of Independent Schools (AIS) and forms the second plank in our three-part Macquarie model.*

The third being our Co-curricular Framework which will be released in 2024.

The Macquarie Wellbeing Framework has been developed with the expressed intention of giving our students the skills, dispositions and the voice to care for themselves and others and to know the ways they can reach out for help when the need to. We will launch the framework in Term 1 2023 and, like our Teaching and Learning Framework, it will follow a multi-year implementation program.

I am also thankful for the range of amazing programs which are a part of the whole of child education that is at the core of Macquarie. Our Livestock Show Team has had another incredible year with our students achieving Champion and Reserve Champion Junior Judges, Hugh Mitchell, Year 9, and Nicola Millar, Year 10, respectively, and Reserve Champion Parader Ally Bogie, Year 11, at the Sydney Royal Easter Show. In Swimming, Edward Chapman, Year 10, and Brody Steele, Year 8, represented at All Schools with Brody going on to achieve a bronze at the Nationals. In Athletics, Georgia Cudmore, Year 11, and Benjamin Batten, Year 12, achieved outstanding results across all representative carnivals. In our Junior School, Gigi Windeyer, Year 6, set new standards through swimming and achieved a National Ranking of tenth.

2022 has seen the inaugural Year 7 production *The Dream Keepers and the Golden Orb* being a great success. Our CAPA evening and Macquarie's Got Talent added to the expanding number of cultural events.

The Macquarie Agricultural Pathways Program (MAPP) commenced in 2022 also. This program gave five students the opportunity to work with the staff of Toongi Pastoral company in real world situations on a working farm. MAPP's aim is to develop our program to be the very best Agriculture program in our nation by providing our students with 21st century Agriculture skills and entry into university or farm life depending on their vision for life. We are thankful to Mr Fergus Job and the teams at Toongi Pastoral Company and Australian Strategic Materials.

January 2023 will see the commencement of construction of our new Flexible Classroom building. This building will provide space for Faculties to develop specific learning environments for their key learning areas throughout the Senior School. This resource should come online in the second half of 2023.

History has had many legends; the Loch Ness Monster, Big Foot and the man in the moon to name just a few. It is my hope that 2023 will see the legend that is Air Conditioning (AC) in Henderson Hall move from legend status to reality.

Work has already commenced on this project and it is my firm hope that by our return to school we will be able to enjoy the refreshing goodness of the AC.

All jests aside, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the P&F for their support of this project. The P&F over many years has raised money for this and to see it come to fruition is a great joy for us all. I would also like to specifically thank the 2022 P&F, led by Mrs Sarah Christian, for their amazing achievements in the first 'post-ish-COVID' school year.

In 2022, we have had a Colour Fun Run and a parents' dinner bringing our community together. They have also raised funds for and seen the purchase of our wonderful grand piano and our water bottle filling stations.

## The Macquarie Commendation

The Macquarie Commendation will be presented to a staff member who has achieved a significant, sustained and positive impact on education at Macquarie. They will be a member of staff whose actions and endeavours have made Macquarie a much better place.

The second recipient joined Macquarie Anglican Grammar School in 2004 as a Junior School teacher. She has over her time with us held positions including Director of Teaching and Learning Junior School, Head of Junior School and Pre-K to K-12 Head of Teaching and Learning.

The second recipient of the Macquarie Commendation is Mrs Marina Simcox. The list above includes some of the titles Mrs Simcox has held. These are impressive, but she has also developed and been a significant part of the development of: our literacy and numeracy programs throughout the school, spearheading the team which chose our wonderful Sounds-Write and PR1ME Mathematics programs which are making

such an impact on our Junior School outcomes. Mrs Simcox has also been instrumental in the development of our reporting programs and the roll out of Canvas and the School App.

Mrs Simcox's greatest impact on the learning of Macquarie students is through her leading of the development and implementation of our wonderful Teaching and Learning Framework. This framework is and will develop in our students the skills necessary to be the lifelong learners our society needs.

If you take a moment to reflect on the Macquarie Mission statement which states we aim, "To develop resilient young people who make a difference in the world within a high quality, affordable, Christ-centred education", you can see how the framework will help us achieve this mission.

Perhaps the greatest impact Mrs Simcox has is the time and skill she gives to her colleagues to mentor and guide them to be the very best educators they can be.

Members of the Macquarie community I commend to you the 2022 recipient of the Macquarie Commendation, Mrs Marina Simcox.

2022 has seen our community negotiate our way away from the COVID-19 restrictions. Over the course of this year we have seen a range of research reports exploring the mental health impact that the various restrictions have had on our communities' people both young and old. It is certain that the various levels of restrictions have had an impact on our community and I am thankful for the incredible work that our Wellbeing team members have done with our students this year.

Yet I have recognised something else come to the fore over the past few years in our media, both mainstream and social, and that is the rise of cynicism. In fact, American author Jim Wallis had this to say in a recent interview with *The Sydney Morning Herald*, "The biggest choice today is not between belief and secularism, but between hope and cynicism."

I believe he is correct. Perhaps it has been due to our communities being worn down over the last few years, but I have seen hope go missing in many places. As we enter this Christmas period, I want to encourage us all with a different message.

As the video tells us the gift of Christmas is much more than a drone which lasts for eight seconds. It is a gift that lasts for eternity. It is the great promise of the Bible. It is the whole of the Bible message.

Let's look at a few of the promises of the Bible:

In Isaiah it says: "So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand."

In the book of John, it says: "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world."

In the book of Philippians: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

And in the book of 1 Peter it says: "He himself bore our sins" in his body on the cross, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; "by his wounds you have been healed."

Each of these verses point to the hope, the promise that lives in Jesus. That is why Christmas is such a joyful celebration. God has come to earth in human form to fulfil his promise of hope for eternity.

The angels talking to the shepherds on the day of Jesus' birth put it this way in the book of Luke: "While they were there, the time came for the baby to be born, and she gave birth to her firstborn, a son. And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. # SCHOOL COUNCIL CHAIR'S ADDRESS

(Presented at the 2022 Presentation Days.)

I too would like to acknowledge that we are meeting on the lands of the Wiradjuri people who God first gave this land to, for them to manage and protect, and give my respects to their Elders, past and present.

Of course, I would also like to acknowledge other distinguished guests including Bishop Mark Calder, as well as other School Council members, particularly Mrs Clare Pendlebury.

However, today we are all here to recognise a number of the considerable achievements in 2022 of our students in the Junior School and Senior School of Macquarie Anglican Grammar School.

Thankfully despite regular RAT testing, and at home recovery for those infected by COVID-19 this year, it has been an exceptionally successful year of face-to-face teaching, sporting carnivals, school camps, drama and music concerts and academic achievements. It has been particularly pleasing to see the very positive impact of the Sounds-Write and PR1ME Mathematics initiatives in our Junior School as well as the initial rollout of Building Learning Power to support all students as lifelong learners in developing their dispositions of being Reflective, Relational, Resourceful and very importantly, Resilient.

I am sure both students and parents can remember the challenges the school faced in the middle of the year with the installation of a new high-pressure fire hydrant protection system. Thankfully The Anglican Schools Capital Works group greatly assisted in achieving appropriate certification of this important safety system. The work of The Anglican Schools group office is often overlooked or misunderstood within the school community. However, their expertise from supporting 19 separate schools provides Macquarie with expertise in IT systems, allowing the relative seamless online teaching last year with Canvas, the back office for all accounting and financial reporting, availability of funding lines, risk management tools, capital project oversight and tendering expertise as well as leveraging educational and missional development throughout the 2,500 staff and 16,000 plus students within the Corporation schools.



The Anglican Schools Corporation has also managed the application for a grant to partially fund the new general learning areas being built opposite Henderson Hall and God willing, will be available for use by the Senior School in the second half of 2023. These additional facilities will allow further areas to be dedicated to particular subjects and allow further resources to be dedicated to encouraging students to develop greater interest in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM). It was great to hear during this year of the Year 9 Science students winning the Western Plains Science and Engineering Challenge, Stage 3 winning the Western Plains Science and Engineering Discovery Day, the completion of the Curiosity Lab and the commencement of the first Science Extension class. These achievements support the increasing opportunities available to use these skills both here in Dubbo and further afield as more and more businesses highly value these skills.

Many years ago, I had a particular interest in Physics and Chemistry which led me to study a degree in Chemical Engineering. Thus, I was particularly interested at the launch earlier this year of the Year 7 Agricultural program with Toongi Agricultural Company of the plans of Australian Strategic Materials to build a Lithium and rare earths recovery plant some 20 kilometres outside the city and the huge need for such engineering skills right here within a few years. There is an increasing need for staff with such STEM skills, whether you work directly in such fields or closely with companies in those fields as I did in my professional career.

I trust with the capable support of all the teaching staff here at Macquarie, that the opportunities available to those graduating from the school with strong academic foundations, will allow these young men and women here today to assist in addressing the major transition issues we face as a nation in adapting to climate change. Whether that be by adding value to raw materials mined here, the associated health challenges of future generations, the increasing need of IT professionals for a myriad of new enterprises or even the higher educational demands of future generations requiring more resources in the teaching and learning sector.

So, I would like to finish my remarks by acknowledging the tremendous effort and commitment of your Headmaster Craig Mansour, the School Executive and all the staff in not only rising to the challenges of 2022 but achieving great results in the academic, cultural and pastoral activities here at Macquarie.

However, the most important part of the school community is the effective partnership between the school and parents in nurturing the desire to learn, to try again, to improve, to explore and to grow. So, I thank all parents and carers in their support and encouragement of their children to fully embrace the opportunities available to them at Macquarie. Can I also give a very big thank you to the P&F Committee for their tireless work in supporting so many activities of the school.

This leads me finally to the reason we are all here, at the end of a challenging year of educational growth of every student at Macquarie. Each of our students has applied themselves whether in the classroom, on the sporting field, in the paddocks or agricultural shows, in the Co-curricular activities of drama, choir or music or at the school camps to develop their skills and knowledge and to be Reflective, Relational, Resourceful and Resilient in all they seek to do. 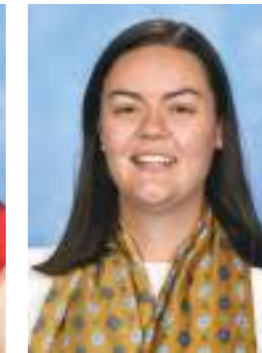

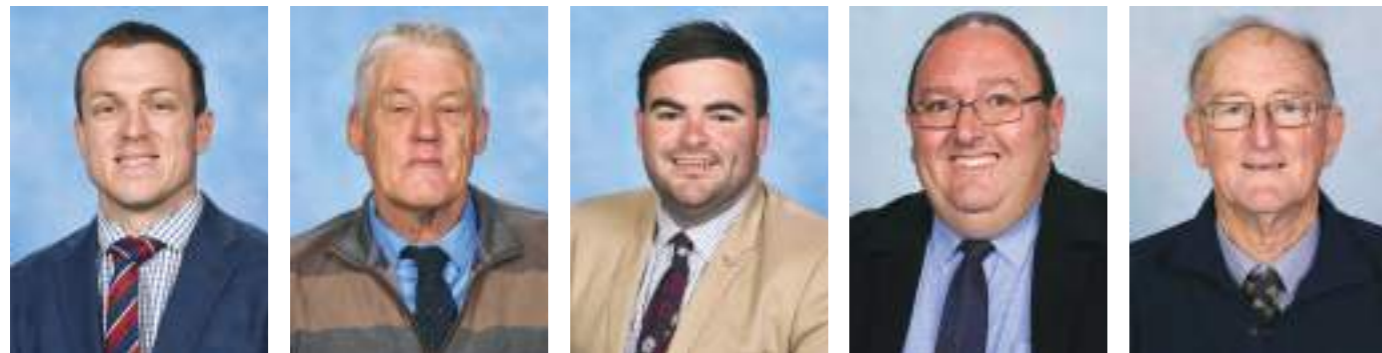

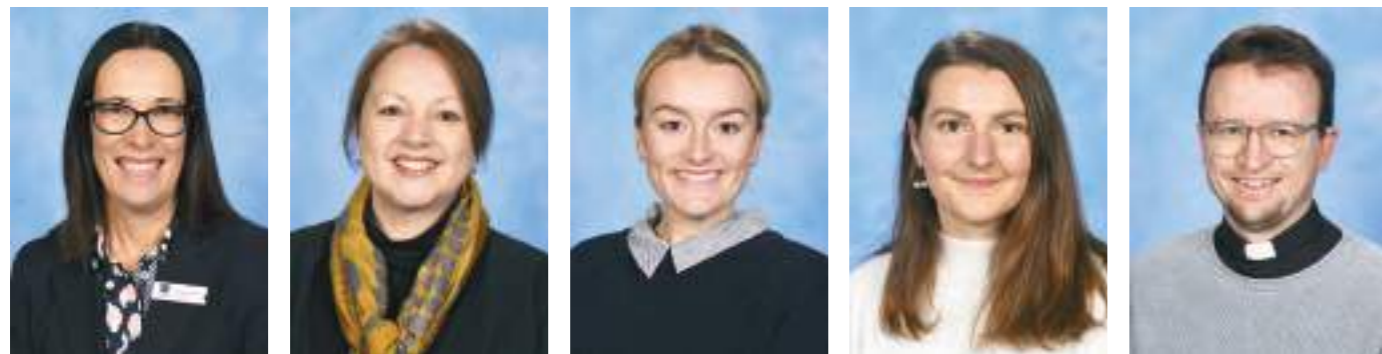

## HEAD OF JUNIOR SCHOOL'S REPORT

2022 was a year for connecting community as life and school moved back into a space of normality. The past several years saw changes to our normal school routine, and our students and staff adapting to new ways of teaching and learning due to COVID-19. We were thrilled to have everyone back on site from the beginning of the school year, without the disruption to our learning programs in previous years.

It is always a thrill to hear our students actively put these skills to practise as they support each other in the ways they manage themselves, their emotions and their interactions with others.

Junior School students continued to play an active role in our whole school community and represented our school on the Macquarie Livestock Show Team, as well as in choir, band and dance troupes, and in public speaking and debating fields. I am continually reminded of the breadth of talent of our students and their outstanding achievements and accomplishments in Co-curricular fields during their time with us at Macquarie.

## JUNIOR SCHOOL WELLBEING

Junior School students continued to engage with the Second Step social and emotional learning program this year. Our units this year taught the skills and concepts of:

- Skills for Learning
- Bullying Prevention
- Friendships
- Empathy
- Emotion Management
- Problem Solving.

A primary focus of our Wellbeing programs is the notion of being responsible. Being responsible helps make Macquarie a place where everyone can learn. When we are responsible, we can be trusted to do the right thing. We help others. We clean up our messes. We admit when we make mistakes and learn from them. We focus on our schoolwork. We are a team.

We also talked about being respectful, and reinforced that our classroom and school rules include being respectful to one another. Students learned that it is not respectful to call people names that hurt their feelings and that saying kind words to others helps you make and keep friends!

Macquarie continues to display a united front against bullying. Our Second Step lessons focused on the 3 R's: Recognising, Reporting and Refusing bullying behaviour. Students learned that bystanders have great power and can help refuse bullying by reporting the behaviour for someone, standing up for others and being an inclusive and kind friend.

Throughout the year students also participated in Child Protection Week, celebrating 'Every child, in every community, needing a fair go'. The week focused on the understanding that children need to grow up feeling safe and supported. Our Junior School students worked with Child Protection programs and classroom activities to equip them with further knowledge and skills to keep themselves and each other safe.

## Pre-Kindergarten

# The learning structure within the classroom.

The Pre-Kindergarten class did a number of fun and exciting things this year including our daily structured learning, our participation in the Dubbo Show and Eisteddfod dance and a variety of activities to develop fine and gross motor skills within and outside the classroom.

### Lessons

The learning structure within the Pre-Kindergarten classroom followed a regular routine which consisted of Literacy, Numeracy and Social and Emotional lessons taught throughout the day. The students were also provided with structured play time where they worked to build their fine motor and creative arts skills.

In Literacy we worked to develop our letter and sound recognition and gain an understanding of how to blend sounds together to make whole words. Within Numeracy the students built on their knowledge of numbers, shapes and patterns through a range of play based and hands-on activities and practised their writing skills and applying their knowledge to the physical environment.

Our Second Step social and emotional lessons aimed to assist students in interacting with their peers and others positively and kindly, and managing and identifying their strong feelings. Additionally, as part of our Literacy program, the Pre-Kindergarten students engaged in a 'Shared Story' each

week, which focused on developing their vocabulary and comprehension. Students were provided with the opportunity to create beautiful artworks based on these weekly stories and further develop their fine motor skills and creative art skills.

### Dubbo Show

Pre-Kindergarten students attended the Dubbo Show with the Kindergarten classes, their teachers and parent volunteers. We enjoyed the morning at the show and were able to visit the animal petting zoo and interact with the animals. We were fortunate to visit the train pavilion where we saw the train exhibits, asked questions, and learned to appreciate the value and set up of the displays. We then enjoyed recess at the show on the grass, and saw the cattle from our Livestock Show Team being judged. Some of us were able to pat a cow and calf. It was busy and exciting and we had so much to see as we passed through the pavilions including craft/art. Finally, we were able to see a circus where we saw the acrobats do some amazing gymnastics and tumbling. It was exciting to be at the show and experience and enjoy the community event.

### Dubbo Eisteddfod

During Term 2, Pre-Kindergarten participated in the Dubbo Eisteddfod competition at the Dubbo Regional Theatre and Convention Centre. They worked extremely hard during the term with Miss Spencer to learn their dance to the Hi-5 song *Ready or Not*. After many weeks the students took a



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bus to the Dubbo Regional Theatre and Convention Centre to perform their dance. Many other schools, parents and carers attended and watched the Pre-Kindergarten dance. Their hard work and dedication showed throughout their performance and they were awarded first place, and received an award and trophy to be displayed at school. We were all extremely proud of Pre-Kindergarten and the effort they put into their dance.

### Fundamental Movement Skills

Throughout Semester 1 students developed their gross motor skills, and fundamental movement skills including locomotor and object control. They enjoyed using the oval to practise, refine and develop skills through team sports and games, using a range of sports equipment. They increased their strength, agility, speed and co-ordination, whilst having fun and enjoying the outdoors.

### KinderGym

Pre-Kindergarten students participated in KinderGym each week during Term 3. This encouraged all students to engage in and develop, strengthen and refine their large muscle skills, co-ordination and flexibility. Each Monday the students caught the bus to Fitness Focus and were able to enjoy the KinderGym experience and develop their skills - balancing, upper and lower body strength, core muscles, posture and the ability to persevere to become confident and engaged.

### Superstar Readers

Throughout the year, students in Pre-Kindergarten developed their literacy skills through the Superstar reader program. All students enjoyed reading and self-selecting books to read over a week. This further developed an interest in reading, as students developed words, language, increased vocabulary, print awareness and early literacy skills.

### Grandparents' Day

The students at Pre-Kindergarten were very excited to have their grandparents visit them at school for Grandparents' Day. The students completed artworks with their grandparents, played inside and outside the Pre-Kindergarten room and had lunch. Pre-Kindergarten spent the beginning of the term practising their item, *Mr Clicketty Cane*, which they performed for their grandparents in the hall. It was a beautiful day and so lovely to see everyone enjoying themselves.

### Kindergarten Orientation

Pre-Kindergarten students were able to enjoy a week of orientation in Kindergarten to familiarise themselves with the Kindergarten classroom, staff and form connections with the school community. They were able to engage in literacy lessons, PE with Mr Richardson, Music with Mrs Heggie, numeracy and art. They were also able to develop their independence, responsibility and confidence as they became familiar with the Kindergarten routine.

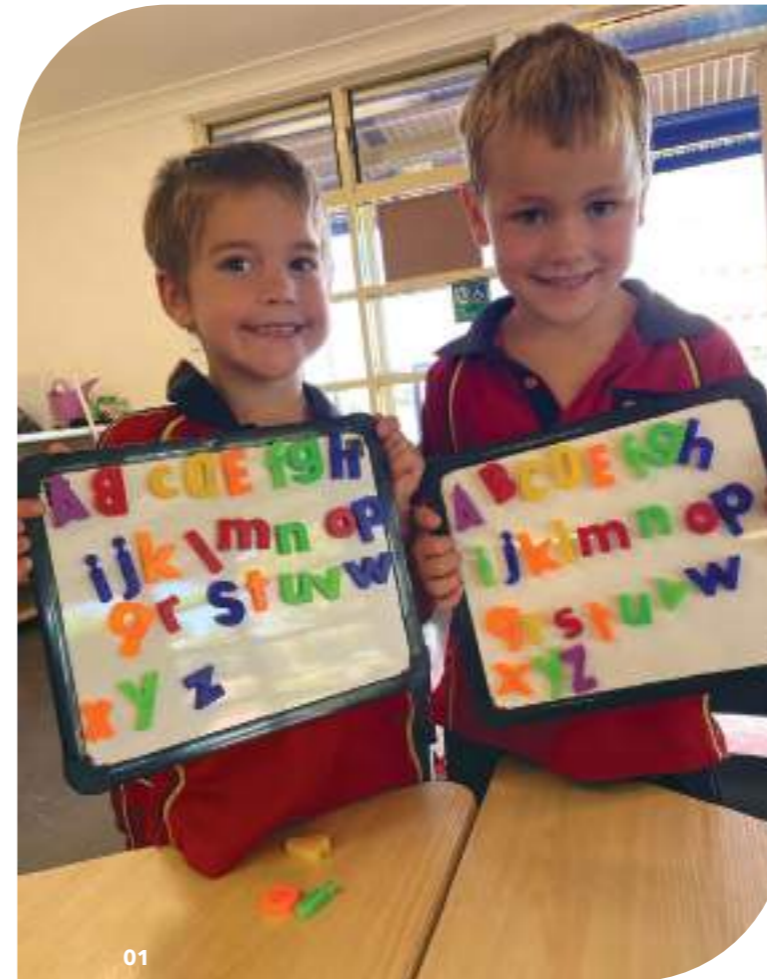

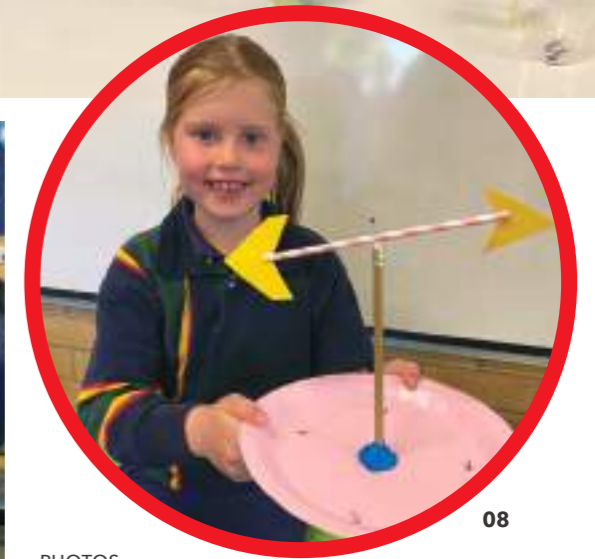

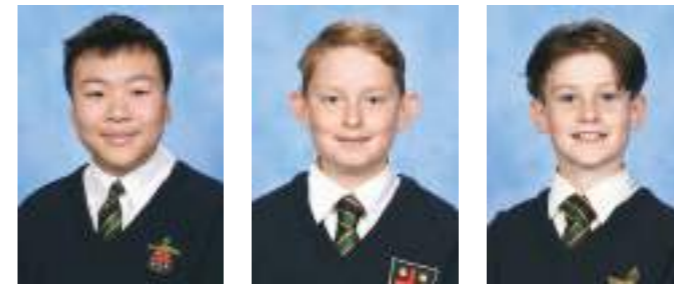

## DEPUTY/HEAD OF SENIOR SCHOOL REPORT

After two years of COVID-19 disruption, Macquarie was blessed to have a full year of face-to-face learning in 2022. Interesting fact - 2022 was the first full year of high school on site for our Year 9 students! I was amazed at our students' capacity to adapt, and congratulate all for their resilience in these extraordinary times. The busyness of the school calendar would suggest we wasted no time getting back into the normal flow of excursions, Co-curricular activities, school camps, information evenings and celebratory events.

As a passionate educator I am immensely proud of Macquarie's new Teaching and Learning Framework, officially launched in March 2022 and based on the work of Guy Claxton and others, called Building Learning Power. The rollout of the framework was expertly led by Head of Teaching and Learning, Mrs Marina Simcox. Over the course of the year students and teachers became familiar with the language of the 4 R's - Resilient, Relational, Resourceful and Reflective, all skills and attributes that form the core of how we teach and learn at Macquarie. Going forward, the Building Learning Power Teaching and Learning Framework will be consolidated and embedded in programs, reports and practice.

One of my first goals as Deputy at Macquarie was to invest time in working with Performing and Creative Arts staff to rebuild Macquarie's Co-curricular Arts offering. Having spent the better part of two years with COVID-19 restrictions on all schools around singing and playing instruments, let alone performing in a musical, there was an opportunity to start again at Macquarie. To this end, in 2022 the Creative and Performing Arts team commenced separate Junior and Senior School Choirs, a lunchtime guitar ensemble and a keyboard group. A Senior School Creative and Performing Arts Evening was held, which showcased the work and God given talents of elective Music, Art and Technology students, with Food Technology students catering culinary delights for guests. There was a whole school Macquarie's Got Talent evening, complete with dance, comedy, vocal and instrumental categories. In December, Macquarie held a carols evening, with Junior School class items, a combined Choir performance and various solos and vocal ensemble performances. The P&F supported the rebuild of the Creative and Performing Arts program by raising funds to purchase a grand piano for the school, which now takes pride of place in Henderson Hall.

2022 saw the inaugural Year 7 Production project come to fruition with performances of *The Dream Keepers* and *the Golden Orb*. This all-encompassing design project sat within the Mandatory Technology course, enabling all Year 7 students to dance, sing and act their way across the stage. Students were responsible for every aspect of their show, including the script, sets and costumes. Ideas created by the winning playwrights, Spencer Simcox, Alicia Fordham and Max Taylor, were reworked by Director Mrs Taylor into a fabulous fantasy story involving four realms, a villain and his side-kick Mad Cat, and of course, a hero. We look forward to the next Year 7 Production in 2023.

The Senior School Camp program is a sequential experiential program designed to challenge students in the great outdoors. Camps included experiences at Somerset, Camp Wombaroo, an Urban Challenge and a retreat for Year 12 students. Year 11 attended the inaugural trip to Cairns. This camp proved to be highlight after highlight with experiences including a tour of Sydney University, watching the musical *An American in Paris*, a Daintree Rainforest visit and guided Dreamtime tour, paddle

boarding on the clear waters of the Mossman River, a visit to Mossman Gorge, canyoning and snorkelling on the outer reef.

Understanding the value of opportunities to lead, all students in Year 12 attended the GRIP Leadership conference in Dubbo. Staff guided students to consider ways to improve and run school assemblies, how to run successful fundraising activities, public speaking skills and more. It was great to see our students return motivated to try new things in their various leadership roles.

Partnering with the Association of Independent Schools (AIS) Macquarie was one of three schools who worked together to design a Careers event for students in Years 7 and 8. The event involved students meeting volunteers from more than 25 local businesses in the fields of Health, Engineering, Construction, Education and Agriculture, to learn about the myriad of career opportunities available to them, right here in the local region. Mr Dugald Saunders gave a keynote address and had students hanging off every word. The event was immensely successful with students participating enthusiastically.

The Toongi project is another example of Macquarie partnering with local business to enhance student learning opportunities. The Macquarie Agricultural Pathways Program (MAPP) is a joint project between the school and Australian Strategic Materials that has enabled five Year 7 students to attend school on a farm one day a week. This hands-on approach has allowed the students to fully engage in experiential projects on the farm, and to apply their learning to other subjects. The program will expand in 2023 to include an additional five students from the incoming Year 7 cohort.

The final week of Senior School was marked by the Interest Based Electives (IBE) program, as well as a Step-Up program for students in Year 10 in the subjects of Mathematics and English. The IBE program saw like-minded students from Years 7 to 10 grouped vertically to enjoy activities such as Christmas Cooking, Billy Cart Making, Games, Weaving, Photography, Trivia, Iconic Fashion, Gym, Swimming, Engineering competitions and more. I observed students engaging enthusiastically in their activities and having fun with each other and their teachers – it really was a lovely way to end the term.

Macquarie students are blessed with a rich offering of academic pursuits, sports, arts and service learning opportunities. Together with experienced and dedicated staff, a Macquarie education is an education worth having.

### Mentoring Program

The bespoke Mentoring Program has seen the following students enjoy learning beyond the classroom:

Yousef Ridha's, Year 10, mentoring was a short-term program involving meeting two mentors targeting his interest in entrepreneurship. He initially spoke with Scott Phillips who is the Motley Fool's Chief Investment Officer in Australia and writes for national newspapers as well as speaking on television. Secondly, Yousef met with Effie Benias, a marketing manager for major national radio companies. His focus with this mentor was analytics and podcast structure.

Our second student who is up and running or should I say up and cycling is Isabelle Russell, Year 10. Isabelle is a cyclist who competes in both track and road cycling at a national level! She hopes to gain a university education and lay the groundwork for a professional career whilst also pursuing a career in cycling. Thus, her aim for the mentoring program was to have someone that could help her balance both successfully. We reached out to the Australian Cycling Team and incredibly Grace Brown, Commonwealth gold medallist and ranked 11th in the world, offered to mentor! The two met via Zoom every two to four weeks and are currently working on elite athlete programs and study pathways.

Annalise Somerville, Year 8, is focusing on politics and is following a similar pattern to Yousef with a bespoke group of mentoring experiences that have included meeting with Senator Sue West and our mayor Mathew Dickerson.

Finally, Nicholas Croker, Year 11, is working with local author Val Clark on refining his skills in writing a novel.

*Macquarie's Agricultural Pathways Program (MAPP) assists students in transitioning what they learn in the classroom into their real world, and develops the skills necessary to be employable in the Agriculture sector or to prepare them for entry into Tertiary-based programs. Our first five students write ...*

We began the Macquarie Agricultural Pathways Program in early Term 3. We were all very excited to have been chosen for the program, but also quite nervous about what it would involve and what we would have to do. As the weeks went on we got to know each other and learned to work as a team to achieve a number of different jobs.

A typical Toongi day would involve meeting Mrs Taylor at school in the morning, loading the Everest and heading out to either Grandale or the Site Office where we would meet Mr Job and make a plan for the day. We would always have a Tool Box Talk during which we would discuss the safety requirements and make a list of the equipment we would need. Once we were organised, we would get to work.

Some of the jobs we did included fencing, drafting sheep and cattle, marking calves, drenching and checking crops. In doing this work, we came to realise and value the importance of Mathematics, Science and English in the Agricultural world. For example, we would not have been able to do any fencing without first calculating the amount of wire and posts we would need.

We had some interesting, new and fun experiences in our time at Toongi. Charlie enjoyed working with the cattle and learning the Low Stress Stock handling method. George's favourite day was a muddy one in the yards drafting some fresh cattle. Lachy got really involved in mustering cattle and doing sheep work. Darcie enjoyed any work that we did with the sheep and cattle. Nellie's highlight was walking through the pine forest, or as she called it, the fairy trees. And we all had a fun time playing hide and seek in the crop.

We are really grateful that we were chosen to be the first students in this program and we wish to thank Toongi Pastoral Company, ASM and Macquarie for giving us this opportunity. We are looking forward to the years to come at Toongi.

## SENIOR SCHOOL WELLBEING

It was a fantastic year for Senior School Wellbeing. We implemented Year Meetings twice a term to enable students to build positive relationships within their cohort. These Year Meetings consisted of icebreakers or initiative games and important messages which we need to pass on to students in regard to personal safety, communicating online, vaping and fostering positive mental health.

In September, our school recognised R U OK? Day and used the opportunity to spark conversations surrounding our own mental health and that of others. Students practised the four-step formula in order to emphasise the importance that the conversation needs to go beyond simply asking but following up to ensure the other person feels well supported:

1. Ask R U OK?
2. Listen
3. Encourage action
4. Check in.

The aim of Stand Tall is to equip youth with the skills of resilience, the strength to stand up to bullying, the keys to motivation, the power of perspective, plus the benefits of making good and wise decisions. The event included world renowned guest speakers including Michael Crossland, Glen Gerreyn and Tony Hoang as well as performances by Bella Taylor Smith (*The Voice* winner 2021), Timomatic (musician/dancer) and Lance Russell and Ryley Davis (freestyle motocross).

# SERVICE PROGRAM

A conversation that is often raised with students at Macquarie is what can students do for others? To enable students to do good for others, four service courses operate throughout the year for students in Stage 5.

In 2022, students participated in the following courses:

- Cook For Good – working with Anglicare
- School Service – gardening and paper recycling
- School Service – assisting staff in their classrooms and with other projects
- River Care.

Macquarie has an ongoing partnership with Anglicare where the Cook for Good class prepared and packaged food each fortnight, sponsored by Delroy Woolworths, for those in need. Students developed their collaboration skills while learning to maintain a clean and tidy workspace in a busy environment. In addition, having the opportunity to provide this service to our wider community gives students a great sense of awareness of the needs of some community members and helps to instil empathy for those less fortunate than ourselves. We thank Delroy Woolworths for their ongoing sponsorship of this great cause, and Anglicare for partnering with us.

One of the School Service courses saw students choosing a gardening project per term to beautify the school. Students studied some types of gardens and gardening techniques after which they decided what to buy and spent some time planning the project. In most cases students had an excursion to buy everything they needed for their project, which was then completed throughout the course of the term. Some students in this course chose to revive the Paper Recycling program by ordering new recycling boxes and making sure that all the recycling boxes across the school were emptied into the recycling skip once a fortnight.

Another group assisted Junior School staff with administrative jobs around the school including creating student work portfolios, helping Stage 2 students with arts and craft and participating in learning through play activities. Students constructed new barbecues and a pedestal heater. They cleaned out the sports storeroom and took an inventory of sporting equipment and classroom furniture.

River Care consisted of students familiarising themselves with the importance of our river systems and how they benefit towns like Dubbo. Students delved into what it takes to maintain our river's cleanliness to a high standard and created 'action plans' on how we as a community can contribute to the maintenance of our local river system.

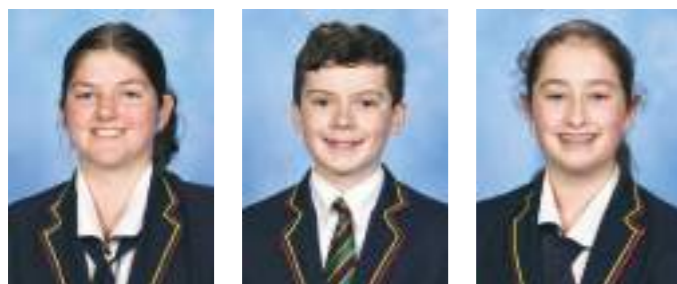

## HSIE

# A busy year for HSIE students.



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2022 was a busy year for our Human Society and Its Environment (HSIE) students with a number of excursions, incursions and a variety of learning experiences from Year 7 through to Year 12.

### Year 7

Year 7 visited the Warrumbungles and applied their geographical skills as they climbed the Macha Tor Summit (750m) on the Gould Circuit Hike. Students worked in teams to study how the land and vegetation changed at various sites and altitudes. In Semester 2, they turned their attention to History and were able to apply what they had learned in class to an archaeological dig site. Students used a variety of tools and techniques to uncover an ancient civilisation buried underneath the school.

### Year 9

Our Year 9 History classes were treated to a visit from Shane Blackman from WWI Living History who setup a simulated WWI trench for our students to experience. Along with a large number of artefacts, Shane showed students some of the realities of WWI and gave our students the inspiration they needed to create their war artefacts for their assessment task.

### Year 12

Year 12 Society and Culture and Modern History classes went on an excursion to Sydney to explore the Jewish History Museum and attend the Personal Interest Project (PIP) Information Day. At the Jewish Museum, students completed a session with an expert on analysing historical sources and were given an amazing opportunity to speak with survivors of the holocaust via the museum's amazing AI technology.

Students attended the Society and Culture Associations annual PIP Information Day. The PIP is a major research project undertaken by Year 12 Society and Culture students over the duration of their HSC. Along with another 1,200 students from across the state, students listened to some of the most experienced Society and Culture teachers give their advice on how to complete an amazing PIP. The day was a wonderful insight for students and will be extremely helpful throughout the creation of their PIPs.

It was exciting to see our students engaging in a diverse range of subjects and working on their HSIE skills. We look forward to another productive year in 2023.

## Science

# Curiosity in Science.

Surprised is the word I would use to describe my reflections on 2022. It was surprising how much happened within Science this year!

Term 1 saw the completion of the Curiosity Lab – a learning and inquiry space in Science that will inspire curiosity in our students. Demolition of a storeroom opened up the space with cabinetry for storage and a whiteboard for visual thinking. It has an orange wall as a nod to NASA's Curiosity Rover on Mars and has become a space that provides enrichment, extension and support to students learning about Science. Students were able to participate in the observation and care of Spiny and Goliath Stick Insects.

Due to a clash with the Year 10 Camp in Term 1 (and postponement of the Years 7 to 9 Camps) Macquarie entered a team of Year 9 students into the Western Plains Science and Engineering Challenge. On a day usually reserved for Year 10 students from around the district, it was amazing to hear how well they collaborated and problem solved to complete the challenges. Surprisingly, pleasantly so, they won the competition!

A Zoom call with Dr Karl Kruszelnicki was booked at the end of the previous year. This year it was decided to allow Stage 3 scientists to have this time. As he is such a great communicator, with experience across all ages, it was a huge success!

As COVID-19 restrictions became a thing of the past, the confidence to book excursions grew. Staff and students were more than eager to re-engage in learning outside the classroom. Year 7 students took a day out to visit the Zoo to learn more about classification and adaptations of animals. Year 10 travelled to the Age of Fishes Museum in Canowindra and the Australian Fossil and Mineral Museum in Bathurst. This enhanced the students' understanding of how various types of fossils are formed and what we can learn from them. Students were also surprised to see a T-Rex skeleton towering above them as they explored a variety of other fossils.

We hope that 2023 will bring more opportunities to be curious and inspired by Science!

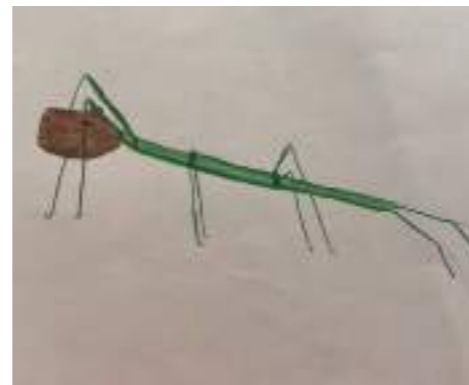

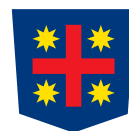
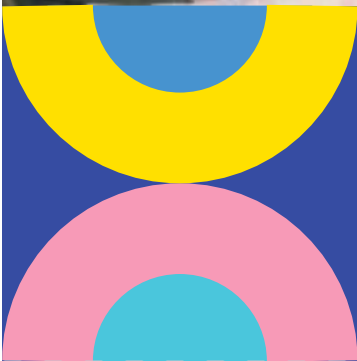
